


tivities, forms that need filling out, etc.

If you do this, the likelihood of you also achieving your membership goal will be very high. We have a great Team assembled for you and the Team is ready to help you achieve success. "One Member per Council per Month," is the theme this year and we have a plan that will assist you. Supreme has recommended that a 1st degree be held in every district every month. We do not want candidates waiting to enter the Order. So you will be allowed to read the parts in the 1st degree. A video of the 1st degree should be available soon.



The Youth Expansion Program (YEP) is coming to a close for the 2012 – 2013 Columbian Year. As of June 20, 2013, the total YEP funds collected is \$112,043.39. These funds represent the contributions from councils and individuals directly to YEP, as well as 50/50 raffles at all state functions/meetings/activities and all donations.

The YEP Goal for this year was \$140,000. As you can see, we fell somewhat short this year. The YEP totals for this year will be used to help set the budget amount for Youth Activities for the 2013-2014 year. Hopefully, we will not have to cut any funding for the many programs that the YEP supports. Let's all do our best in the upcoming year to make sure we meet our current goals.

Only 110 councils (38%) in Louisiana participated at any level in the YEP Program. As of June, 20 2013, there are 177 councils in the State of Louisiana that have yet to contribute any amount to the YEP program. The State Council in Louisiana is requesting a better participation from the councils in our state. Our goal is to have all councils participate at some level in YEP.


Councils, get your member's fami-





So the total value of contributions statewide is **\$46 million**. This is a wonderful testimonial of the generosity of the brother knights in Louisiana. Just think of the possibilities if we could double our membership.

We began this fraternal year with our Annual Summer Meeting, held in Lafayette the last weekend of June 2012 and concluding on July 1st. The State Family gathered to hear what our plans entailed for the new fraternal year. We held training sessions on Saturday and Sunday and introduced a new idea of presenting information. Each State Family Member received all of the presentations on a DVD; this will save the State Council several thousand dollars annually. Presentations were created by the Officers, Program Chairmen and Directors in a Power Point Format, in order to save time and to provide information that would be usable for the first 6 months of the fraternal year. We introduced our new Media Department Team, Earl Bulot, Dwayne Dupre, Brandon Hendricks, and Robert Boudreaux. Dwayne created a few videos that we used as infomercials. Good of the Order

To: The Officers and Members of the 108th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council held in Lafayette, La.

Your committee on the Good of the Order met on Saturday, April 27, and fully discussed at length the following activity areas. After due deliberation, the committee urges all council, district and state leaders to see that the following recommendations are fully implemented.

The committee would also ask that at future conventions, each member of the Good of the Order Committee, as appointed, be forwarded a copy of the previous year's Good of the Order report to prepare committee members as to what is to be discussed.

FIRST AND FOREMOST WE ARE CATHOLIC

The committee recommends the recitation of the Serran Prayer for Vocations, or another appropriate vocations prayer, at each council meeting and that the council chaplain should encourage the recitation of this prayer at all Masses. The committee further recommends that a prayer be offered at each council meeting for the beatification of our founder Father Michael J. McGivney. The council chaplain should be encouraged to be actively involved in council activities. In the absence of the council Chaplain, a deacon shall be asked to bring the message of our faith. The committee urges all councils to participate in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP). Each council should consider sponsoring a speaker on vocations to the various parochial schools. Recognizing that some clergy may still be apprehensive to Knights of Columbus involvement, the committee recommends each council strongly consider implementation of the Parish Round Table Program and thus show evidence of our belief that VOCATIONS ARE OUR BUSINESS and that each Grand Knight has a dialogue with each Pastor of churches in his council area. Each council should consider having a speaker on evangelization, to encourage each member to promote the Catholic faith to non-Catholics, and to help fallen-away Catholics to become again active in the Church. One way this can be done effectively is by supporting evangelization through the RCIA program.

PRO-LIFE

The committee recommends increased efforts from the state level to provide more timely and specific information to the council level about upcoming activities such as Pro-Life Rallies. The committee encourages area, district and local Right to Life Masses and demonstrations. It is also recommended that continued active exposure to the public by each council be pursued. The committee encourages each council to construct a monument to the unborn in a prominent place, preferably on the church grounds and those that have one to maintain and have programs to bring Pro-Life to parishioners attention. We urge right-to-life education, to fight abortion, and specific projects, such as enforcement by members and Grand Knights of letter writing campaigns from council members to state and federal governing bodies. We also urge the use of the vast amount of material that is available about the AIDS Virus, and promoting abstinence and chastity as a way of decreasing the threat of AIDS as well as decreasing abortions and moral decay.

The committee also recommends that councils become involved with local Right-To-Life organizations by way of participating in their events and getting on their mailing lists. The committee urges use of material available to them from the Supreme Council pertaining to Pro-Life. The committee also urges members to fight pornography at the council, family and school levels. The committee further recommends that the State Council provide updated information of current Federal and State legislation on Pro-Life and Euthanasia.

The Committee reommends each council appoints a Pro-Life Chairman or Chair-Couple; supports a youth Pro-Life Retreat as sponsored by the State Council; and offer a Pro-Life prayer at business meetings.

My council, 7557, has been truly gracious to Pris and I, my brother knights and the Ladies Auxiliary took charge of the event and did an outstanding job. Because of their kindness and support, I will cherish this memory for the rest of my life. We had a usual event take place during the installation of Officers. According to the Supreme Constitution, when the Bishop of the hosting Diocese is present, he shall install the State Chaplain. Attendance was outstanding; we fed 650 people for lunch. We utilized breakout sessions for Membership, Programs, and Financial Secretaries, in a rotation format. Richard Yandle, Membership Director, and his Team, presented our membership goals and our ideas of how to achieve the goals. Jose Jimenez, our Supreme MPC, assisted us and also presented a membership power point presentation that was inspirational. Vince Whittington, Program Director, managed the Program presentations and was joined by his Program Team. I am truly grateful to Vince and his Team for doing a very fine job presenting Programs. The State Officers along with



Robert Boudreaux, conducted a mini KCLS in Bossier City. Area Coordinator Larry French and PSD Ben Davidson took care of all of the details; so that all we had to do is show up; thank you Ben and Larry for setting this event up for the State Council.

Our Mid-Year Meeting was hosted by Area D Coordinator, Curtis Constrantiche, in Houma. We tried a different approach this fraternal year. We incorporated Grand Knight's Day with the Mid-Year Meeting. So Grand Knights Day was held on the Sunday. The meetings went very well; once again we incorporated power point presentations and videos to illustrate our plan and introduced the programs for the second half of the year. We also evaluated our membership goals and how we planned to continue with the second half of the year. We encouraged Corporate Communions, Church Drives, Welcome Back, and serious retention measures to facilitate membership growth. The turnout for both meetings was a little weak. I expected to have better attendance, but we will continued to work through this year to attain our goals.

The Supreme Convention was held in Anaheim, CA, in August. All of the elected Delegates attended along with all of the State Officers. Our State Advocate, Paul deMahy and his wife Marilyn acted as our hosts for the week. They took care of the Hospitality room for us as we attended the meetings. They were very hospitable and all attendees were very grateful. During our stay in Anaheim, we witnessed several earthquakes, a first for yours truly. That was an interesting experience to say the least. The Supreme Council focused on Religious Freedom and most of the

speakers gave their ideas about Religious Freedom. Cardinal Dolan was Key Note Speaker at the Banquet and spoke about Marriage and Family. Many Cardinals, Bishops, and Priests, attended the convention. Our Delegation was joined by our State Chaplain, Bishop Herzog and Associate Chaplains', Father Mark Derise, and Father Frank Carabello.

MEMBERSHIP is the focal point of every new fraternal year. We all share in an obligation to continue to add new members to our great Order. The theme for membership this year is "ONE MEMBER PER MONTH PER COUNCIL" and our Membership Director, Richard Yandle, and his Team, have done an outstanding job this year in promoting membership each month. Later this year Paul Gagnet, known by all as "Uncle Paul" was asked and accepted a membership role in the New Orleans Metro Area. This year has been an unusual year for retention Order wide and Louisiana is suffering with large amounts of suspensions, but we are also bringing in new members. New Council Development Chairman, Gerard Thomas, and his Team have done an outstanding job working to establish new councils. In Amelia, Vicen Alvarez, and DD Wade Bourg, established a new Hispanic Council, whose membership has grown to about 50. DD Darryl Gonzales in the New Orleans area established Mater Delarosa Council and is working on several more with Gerard Thomas. The New Council Development Team is working on several more potential councils currently in the development stages. We have the potential of establishing 6 or 7 new councils this fraternal year. Area Coordinator George Boudreaux has reactivated Council 10057 on the west bank of New Orleans. Councils are beginning to conduct membership drives with spring in the air and the Lenten season behind us. So I am very hopeful that we will bring in copious amounts of new members, work our Welcome Back Program and reactivate suspended members. Our membership goals are still attainable this fraternal year.

CEREMONIALS are an integral part of our Order, every new member must go through a 1st degree exemplification and this fraternal year we emphasized that each new recruit should go through the 2nd and 3rd degree. Since retention is a major concern, new candidates who go through all three degrees will most likely, remain in the Order much longer and perhaps, for life. So it is critical to the perpetuity of our Order that we insist that every new recruit go through all three degrees. Our IPSD Ronnie Boudreaux is our Ceremonials Chairman, he brings years of experience to Ceremonials and I am truly grateful for his volunteerism and support in Ceremonials. We have Degree Teams throughout our State. This facilitates a savings on travel expense, and it also allows us to host multiple major degrees on the same day. I wish to thank all of the degree teams in our Jurisdiction for performing a great service for their brother knights, every team is outstanding and a credit to Columbianism in Louisiana.

PROGRAMS are a very important and an integral part of the Knights of Columbus, without programs we would not be able to recruit new members; it is through our programs where we find charitable works done by faithful brother knights throughout the state. Our Program Director, Vince Whittington has done a great job this year and his Program Team has worked

very hard to provide programs that will benefit the needy, youth, seminarians, and offer sporting events that challenge our brother knights. We modified an existing program, Acompano, and created a new program, The Seminarian Mission Fund Program. Bishop Herzog added his suggestions to the program and sent out letters to Council Chaplains asking them to consider supporting the new program. Dwayne Dupre created a great video that illustrates the program and our goal to provide the necessary funds to support the annual mission trip taken by seminarians. We hope to have a surplus of funds generated by contributions and we will keep an accounting of the surplus funds in each diocese. The funds will be sent at the discretion of the Bishop of each diocese, to the seminaries and seminarians of our state. Our MDF Program, Lloyd Meyers, Chairman, raises funds to support the mentally challenged throughout the state. Councils choose worthy organizations within their communities that will benefit from their hard work and fund raising. As of April 2nd councils have donated about \$360,000 statewide and will continue to donate until June 30. Louisiana Special Olympics has asked the State Council to support TEAM LOUISIANA, we launched the TEAM on April 6, with a picnic, the team will participate in the 2014 National Games, so we will continue to ask councils to support Team Louisiana with donations so that every special needs child will be able to participate in the National Special Olympic Games in 2014. Jerry LaSalle is our Special Olympics Chairman and has chaired this position for several years; Jerry and his wife attended many National Special Olympic Games and have

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BISHOP GRECO MEMORIAL FUND

The committee recommends that all councils use the memorial cards to memorialize deceased council members. The card can be filled in with the name of the deceased and the name of the donating council. The card is mailed to the member's family. A suggested donation of \$25.00, however any amount is accepted, and sent to the Greco Foundation for the trust fund.

The committee also recommends that councils make a voluntary contribution of \$1.00 per member, on annual basis, to the Bishop Greco Memorial Fund..

RETREATS

The committee recommends that each council have a guest speaker with Catholic Retreats as the subject, and schedule retreats for its members, individual as well as couples, encouraging husband and wife retreats whenever offered.

FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

The committee recommends continual family involvement in council activities. The committee also recommends each council have a monthly Family Communion. The committee strongly recommends that widows of deceased council members be included and recognized in every aspect of the council's life and activity. This committee further recommends that the council members make themselves available to provide assistance to widows and receive a copy of the council news letter and provide transportation if needed.

YOUTH EXPANSION PROGRAM

The committee urges each council to actively support the Youth Expansion Program by annually exceeding it's YEP quota, and by involvement in a youth organization such as Columbian Squires, Boy or Girl Scouts and/or Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). The committee recommends that all members in each council be asked to make a personal contribution to our Youth Expansion Program and councils should not depend on fund-raisers only. Each council should consider either making it a part of the dues or adding to their billing a \$10.00 voluntary contribution by each member. The committee recommends that all councils participate in the CYLA Program and that efforts be made to properly recognize the applicants and winners on the council level.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE-HEALTH SERVICES

The committee recommends each council sponsor an educational program on substance abuse by the law enforcement agencies to local junior and senior high schoolstudents. The committee urges all Knights to recognize local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The committee further recommends that councils establish blood donation drives, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training programs and community blood pressure surveys.

FRATERNAL MEMBERSHIP-NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

The committee wishes to compliment the first degree and major degree teams in the Louisiana Jurisdiction for their excellent exemplifications which act as catalysts in encouraging all councils to obtain new, active members. The committee wishes to remind all members that it is our Supreme Council's desire that we have a KC presence in every church parish and that we should aid all efforts to form a new council or a Parish Round Table. It is also recommended that all members proposing new members into our Order assume responsibility for insuring the first-degree member receives his major degree as soon as possible, and remains an active member. Also, we congratulate all councils that sponsor a first degree team and we strongly recommend that every council make an attempt to establish a team, and that all ceremonials be performed with the proper dignity. The committee recommends that every council make an effort to bring in new members, but that no less effort be expended to retain the members they now have. Council leaders and members should promote patriotism and encourage members of the third degree to join the fourth degree. Councils should make an effort to form

dedicated their lives to this most worthy cause. Youth Expansion Program is funded through the generosity of our councils. Each year we provide budgeted funds that benefit our Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program, Columbian Squires, Seminarians, Soccer and Free Throw, youth retreats, and Camp Joshua. We lost a very dear friend and Past State Deputy, Leo Segalla this fraternal year. Leo started Camp Joshua in Louisiana.

Leo volunteered his time and talents to many very worthwhile causes, he will be dearly missed. Camp Joshua has evolved into a dynamic program, conducted in Baton Rouge and Ruston, Vince Whittington, chairs this program. Our CYLA Program is one of our most fulfilling programs, benefitting High School Seniors. Each year we find outstanding Catholic high school seniors who are role models for their peers and an inspiration to all of us. This year is no different and our CYLA Champions will speak at our Banquet this evening.

Joel Ocmand is our State CYLA Chairman this year and has done an outstanding job, Joel has held this position for several years and each year he has provided outstanding Catholic Seniors, thank you Joel for a job very well done. Our Columbian Squires Program Chairman, George Martin, has taken a very aggressive role in developing new Squire Circles, recruiting, and creating activities that will foster the perpetuity of the Squires in Louisiana. George was instrumental in establishing the squire website; we have a link to this site available on our state website; Great job George. Youth Program Chairman, Delmas Forbes, continues to find outstanding students that have been recognized by the Supreme Council for their Posters and Essays. The State Council has been represented

extremely well in the past by producing Supreme Council International winners in Posters and Essays. We continue to offer kids soccer and free throw competitions and will do so in the future. All of the mentioned programs would not be possible if we did not have our Youth Expansion Program, Kenny Gonzales, Chairman. YEP provides the necessary funds for all of the youth programs. Through YEP we also provide support to college councils, and a donation of \$75,000 to St. Mary's Residential Center in Msgr. Susi's honor, Msgr. Susi was a former State Chaplain and his memory lives on through St. Mary's in Alexandria. The State Council also sponsored many sporting events; Softball, Golf, Horseshoes, Basketball, Bowling, and a 9 Ball Pool Tournament. Ralph Comeaux is our Chairman, great job Ralph. We also hosted our annual Gumbo Cook off Contest, the finals held on Grand Knights Day. Most of the mentioned events were managed through our state office administrator, Robert Boudreaux. Robert is also working our new website and will be



assisted by Brandon Hendricks and other brother knights as necessary. Our State Office Staff provides us with support for all of our State Meetings. Organization and attention to details is paramount to a successful event and Robert and Susan have, once again risen to the challenge.

and support a Columbian Squires Circle which can be a future source of membership and Ladies Auxiliary. The committee recommends the promoting of young members and make officers and active members promote young ideas. "Turn over the power". Make the KC's a place for young and old to blend and provide babysitters whenever possible. The committee also recommends that all councils send out bulletins monthly or quarterly, and that copies of the bulletin or newsletter be sent to five councils in the state, on a random basis, for the purpose of spreading and stimulating new ideas.

INSURANCE

In view of our Founder Father Michael J. McGivney's purpose to form a Fraternal Benefit Society so that the widows and children of members in the group when the member dies would not find themselves in dire financial straights, Knights of Columbus Insurance was instituted. As the insurance program not only provides this coverage but also helps to finance many of the programs of the Knights of Columbus, we encourage all members to become insurance members, especially State and Council leaders. The committee recommends that all councils have adequate liability insurance as recommended by Supreme.

PROTOCOL

The committee recommends that members of the clergy and Knights of Columbus State Family and officers be properly recognized as to their titles or positions at all Knights of Columbus meetings and functions. Also, we remind members of all the important aspects of protocol as explained in the protocol booklet. The committee also recommends that the State Officers reinstate the policy of visiting subordinate councils and protocol be strictly adhered to.

SERVICE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CITIZENS

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are to be complimented for the tremendous support of the annual statewide fund raising program benefiting the learning impaired. Each council is called upon to continue this important work and to utilize to the fullest the involvement of families, Boy Scouts, Columbian Squires and Ladies Auxiliaries in the fund raising campaign. The committee recommends that councils use publicity to promote the Knight of Columbus donations by secular and religious newspapers. It is recommended that councils become more involved with activities of the learning impaired citizens at the local level and present the funds to them in a personal manner. The committee also urges councils to actively support the Special Olympics Program, as well as St. Mary's Training Facility in Alexandria.

SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY AND INFIRMED

The committee urges each council to become actively involved in providing support for the elderly and infirmed citizens of our communities through such activities as weekly or monthly bingos at the retirement or health care facility, also Christmas-Thanksgiving Dinners, sponsoring Masses and communion services at the facility or just plain visitations. The committee also recommends that councils try to promote these programs at all times of the year, not only holidays and special occasions.

CONCLUSION

The committee urges all councils to implement to the fullest extent, the foregoing recommendations. In order to obtain the fullest implementation of these recommendations, the <u>committee urges the State Deputy to insure that all councils receive and display</u> a copy of this report, and that a summary of this report be published in the June issue of the <u>LOUISI-ANA KNIGHT</u>. I would also like to thank the State Deputy for the privilege of serving on this committee.
