NEW USCCB PRO-LIFE MATERIALS

New pro-life materials are available from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). The theme for this year's materials is: Each of Us is a Masterpiece of God's Creation.

The new booklets cover: advanced medical directives, adoption, the devaluation of human life. healing from an abortion, poverty and abortion, and dealing with a miscarriage.

The booklets provide important information that is not presented by the main stream media on these topics. In short order, they delve deeply into some of the dangers of going along with fashionable viewpoints that seem like a good idea on the surface but actually lead to unintended consequences such as physicians deciding to withhold basic necessities of life or administering medical treatments against the wishes of the patient and family members. Another example is children conceived through IVF being left out of custodial agreements in a divorce The booklets also contain very useful statistics. For example: "If the state's Medicaid program paid for elective abortions, their abortion rate was more than four times that of other women."

In the great civil rights struggle to secure the right to life for all, Archbishop John Roach, testifying on behalf of the Catholic Bishops, expressed the

November 5, 1981 Statement before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution: "We are committed to full legal recognition of the right to life of the unborn child, and will not rest in efforts until society respects the inherent worth and dignity of every member of the human race."

The National Committee for a Human Life Amendment is dedicated to pursuing this vision. The organization's objectives include educating citizens, developing pro-life legislative networks, and offering programs in support of pro-life legislation. Among its various activities, NCHLA produces educational and program resources,

communicates with leaders about legislative

End of Life Issues

"Mercy at the End of Life"

- Dr. John Meinert, Ph. D. from OLOL College gave a talk entitled "Mercy at the End of Life" at the 2016 Life Fest.
 - I want to share some of his insights with you.
- Charity is the supernatural gift that motivates us to seek the good of others.
 - One who possesses charity loves God and loves his neighbor.
- The fruits of charity are joy, peace, and mercy (CCC 1829).
- Mercy is the disposition to be kind and forgiving. It is the ready willingness to help anyone in need, especially in need of pardon or reconciliation (Catholic Dictionary – J. A. Hardon, S.J.).

More on Mercy

- There are two aspects of mercy.
 - Distress and compassion at another in misery.
 - Providing aid; a response to the lack of good.
- What is compassion?
 - It means to suffer with another.
 - I experience the suffering as if it were my own.
 - It is drawn from the life of Christ.

What if aid is not possible?

Simply share in the suffering.

- What is false mercy?
 - It wills evil to another person.
 - Person acted upon does not receive the benefits of the action.
 - It is never permissible to directly bring about another's death to relieve pain and suffering.
- In a totalitarian society, I don't kill you; I get you to kill yourself and you want to do it!

End of Life Issues

- It is important to distinguish between two types of medical intervention:
 - Ordinary
 - Extraordinary



- "A person has a moral obligation to use ordinary means of preserving his or her life. Ordinary means are those that in the judgment of the patient offer a reasonable hope of benefit and do not entail an excessive burden or impose excessive expense on the family or the community."
- "A person may forego extraordinary means of preserving life. Extraordinary means are those that in the patient's judgment do not offer a reasonable hope of benefit or entail an excessive burden, or impose excessive expense on the family or the community."

The Means for Preserving Life

Extraordinary

- Does not achieve its purpose
- Little chance of success
- Burdens are greater than the benefits
- Only prolongs the dying process
- Dangerous, experimental
- Difficult to access
- Costly, beyond available funds

Ordinary

- You have a moral obligation to do this.
- It does not involve any of the conditions given on the left side.

 Food and water (even by artificial means) are always ordinary in principle.

Some Points Regarding End of Life Issues



- The wave of emotions which accompanies the diagnosis of a degenerative or terminal illness may lead a patient to wish death upon himself.
- This is almost always an anguished plea for help and love.
- We need to offer these persons companionship and consolation on their difficult journey.
- Aside from medical care, these patients should be offered love.
- Those close to the patient, parents, children, doctors, and nurses should assure him or her that they will never be abandoned or considered a burden by their loved ones.

Grading Form Guidance

Grading Form Guidance

- Want to encourage a variety of Culture of Life activities.
- No event can be used for credit in more than one question.
 - This is a challenge because activities often have more than one dimension (ex: 40 Days for life has spiritual and promotional aspects).
- Make sure that you help us understand what you did!
 - Describe your event concisely.
 - Include dates, man-hours, money raised/spent in your description.
 - You may not get credit if we cannot understand what was done.
 - Fill out the form on-line if possible.
 - The council chair couple can fill out this form.
- Credit is given even if the work is done only by the Culture of Life chair couple, but we encourage you to plan activities so that council members can participate.
- Newsletter is intended to provide information to enable councils to receive the maximum number of points.

- Did the council submit a State Council Service Program Award and Entry Form (STSP)? (5 points)
- This is a requirement from the State Council.
 - The filled-out form must be sent to the State Office:
 - P. O. Box 51166, Lafayette, LA 70505-1166.
 - If it is sent to us, then the council may not receive credit.
 - Best option: Email filled-out form to Robert Boudreaux.
- It is easy to fill out and pictures are not required.
- If you are having difficulty, please contact us for help well before the deadline: April 5, 2018.

- Did the council sponsor ONE substantial Culture of Life activity? (15 points)
- Substantial support is \$500 or 100 man-hours.
- You must provide details.
 - If we cannot determine the scope of the project, then credit will not be given.
- Suggested activities:
 - Purchase an ultrasound machine through the Supreme Ultrasound Initiative (note: this can be multi-council effort).
 - Pro-life Baby Bottle Campaign.
 - Memorial to the Unborn (erected in the current year).
 - Sponsor an unwed mother.

Qualifying Examples:

- The council organized a parish March for Life with over 800 participants. The event included Eucharistic procession, ending in a pro-life mass and the start of a 5 day Eucharistic adoration congress (Council 1208).
- The council held a Baby Bottle Campaign to benefit Crossroads Pregnancy Resource Center in Thibodaux, LA. The program ran from 1/11/15 to 1/18/15, collecting \$6,298.86 (Council 1317).
- Purchased and delivered Christmas gifts valued at \$650 for unwed mothers at the Covenant House in New Orleans (Council 1437).

- Did the council perform each of the following? (10 pts)
 - Appoint a Culture of Life Chair Couple.
 - Provide the Chair Couple with Culture of Life materials from Supreme and State Council.
 - Complete and submit the Contact Information Form.
- You must provide the contact information before August 31, 2017 to receive 10 points.
 - After that date, the council can only receive 5 points.
 - Minimum information is names and email address.
- Primary communications will be by email, so an email address is very important.
- Notify us as soon as possible if a chair couple change occurs during the fraternal year.

- Did the council sponsor or participate in TWO Culture of Life material support activities? (20 points max)
- Support activity involves providing material aid for a Culture of Life organization or individual.
- You must provide the beneficiary and type of support.
- Suggested activities:
 - Providing money or meals for students to attend March for Life in Washington DC.
 - Making a monetary donation to a Pro-life organization.
 - Cook and serve food at a public pro-life event.

Qualifying Examples:

- St. Peter's church baby bottle campaign collected
 \$3,500 for the DesOrmeaux Foundation (Council 1208).
- The council donated \$300 for lunches for students from the Houma-Thibodaux diocese attending the March for Life in Washington D.C. (Council 1317).
- Provided financial support for one teen to attend PULSE Pro-Life Camp (Council 1317).
- The council donated \$500 to Culture of Life Fund and Catholic Charities Pro-life organizations (Council 1437).
- Donated \$150 to CBIB organization that buries indigent children (Council 10645).

- Did the council sponsor or participate in TWO Culture of Life promotion activities? (20 points maximum)
- Promotion activity involves advertising, providing prolife literature, and participating in a pro-life march.
- The two activities cannot be part of a single event.
- Suggested activities:
 - Putting up pro-life signs or billboards on church property or other public areas.
 - Providing pro-life literature at a KC meeting or parish event.
 - Participating in the March for Life in Washington D.C.
 - Participating in one of the Louisiana Life Marches.

Qualifying Examples:

- Put up pro-life banners at six different local churches (Council 1208).
- Chair couple, family and council members participated in the National Life Chain in Houma, LA on 10/5/14 (Council 1317).
- Council put out 200 white crosses in front of parish church during the month of January (Council 2807).
- Council provided a monetary reward and plaque of recognition for the High School Pro-life Oratory Contest (Council 3407).
- Council distributed pro-life literature after masses during pro-life month (Council 3407).

- Did the council sponsor or participate in ONE Culture of Life spiritual activity? (10 points maximum)
- Spiritual activity involves pro-life prayer and liturgy.
- Suggested activities:
 - A pro-life Rosary with a group involving the council.
 - Organizing a pro-life Mass in your parish.
 - Participating in the Silver Rose program.
 - Organizing a memorial service for the unborn.
 - Participating in 40 Days for Life.
 - Praying for a Culture of Life at each council meeting.
 - Providing pro-life prayer cards to council or parish.

Qualifying Examples:

- Organized a Culture of Life Mass at St. Francis de Sales on 1/11/15 that included the Fourth Degree Honor Guard (Council 1317).
- Council passed out pro-life prayer cards to members at a KC meeting (Council 2504).
- Council members prayed the Rosary and other prayers at 40 Days for Life (Council 2657).
- Council organized a prayer vigil at Ridgelake abortion clinic in Metairie on 10/14/14 (Council 3246).
- Prayed a pro-life Rosary at a local abortion facility (Council 4873).
- Council organized a monthly pro-life Rosary, coordinating with 3 other parishes (Council 5499).

- Did the council sponsor or participate in ONE Culture of Life educational activity? (10 points maximum)
- Educational activity involves learning about pro-life issues and arguments and sharing pro-life information with others.
- Suggested activities:
 - Chair couple gives a pro-life talk at a council meeting.
 - Chair couple attends a pro-life conference.
 - Chair couple attends KCLS.
 - Council provides pro-life literature to council or parish.
 - Write a pro-life article in a council newsletter or bulletin.
 - Invite a Louisiana Right to Life speaker to your council meeting or parish event.

Qualifying Examples:

- Chair couple attended a seminar on abortion issues and how best to defeat legislation that support taxpayer funding of abortion (Council 1108).
- Culture of Life director speaks at each meeting on the latest pro-life activities on a national level (Council 2436).
- Council scheduled a tour of the American Holocaust Memorial in Baton Rouge (Council 3743).
- Council members attended the Bishop's Pro-Life Rally (Council 8342).
- The council pays for its Culture of Life chair couple to attend the annual Baton Rouge Right to Life breakfast focusing on educating the public on pro-life issues (Council 9016).

 Did the council sponsor or participate in ONE Culture of Life citizen advocacy activity? (10 points)

Related activities include:

- Letter writing or email campaign to influence elected officials on Culture of Life issues.
- Voter education program related to Culture of Life issues.
- Providing pro-life comparison guides of election candidates.

Suggested activities:

- Organize council members to send timely emails to elected officials using USCCB Action Center or NCHLA.org.
- Provide LRTL election literature at election time.
- Provide pro-life or Catholic voter guides to members, parishioners, or the public.

Qualifying Examples:

- Twenty members emailed their State and Federal elected officials on bills that funded abortion, force organizations to cover contraceptives for their employees, fund cloning, and redefine marriage (Council 1108).
- Chair couple emailed and phone messaged council members asking them to email, call or write their elected officials to show their support for pro-life legislation (Council 1208).
- Knights gave a presentation to parishioners on the importance of considering a candidate's pro-life positions (Council 1286).
